On August 5, 2014 at approximately 2020 hours I was on duty dressed in the uniform of the day, which consisted of a uniform with police insignia on it. At approximately 2020 hours I was completing paperwork behind 3360 Pentagon Boulevard (Wal-Mart). At around that time dispatch sent an emergency tone over the radio signaling that officers were going to be sent to a high priority/emergency call. Dispatch then called two units over the radio to start towards 3360 Pentagon Boulevard (Wal-Mart) for a weapons complaint.

I was not one of the officers originally dispatched to Wal-Mart. Due to my position directly behind Wal-Mart and the nature of the call; I began to drive to the front of the store as dispatch was giving out details of the call.

Dispatch then advised the following. They said that there was a black male waving a gun around in the store. They said that that the gun in question was a rifle. They said that the male was pointing the gun at people. As I pulled to the front of the store dispatch added that the male appeared to be loading the rifle and was in the pet department of the store.

I called out to dispatch that I was on scene then parked my cruiser near the entrance to the far east entry doors of Wal-Mart. I then deployed my rifle and waited for the next officer to arrive on scene.

Sergeant Darkow then arrived on scene and parked near the western most entry doors to Wal-Mart. I then ran over to his cruiser and met him as he was deploying his rifle and plate carrier.

I then had dispatch confirm that the male with the rifle was pointing it at people. They then confirmed that the male was waving the rifle around and pointing it at people. They stated again that the male was still in the pet department.

Sergeant Darkow and I then entered Wal-Mart through the western most entry doors near the pharmacy. The store was crowded. As we made our way towards the pet department we passed dozens of customers, families, and children. We quickly made our way towards the pet department and we checked each row for the suspect. As we neared the pet department we slowed our pace and carefully checked each row. Sergeant Darkow was leading us as we checked each aisle. The pet department was made up of three to four rows to our left as we made our way down the main corridor. We checked the first few rows but did not locate the suspect. We then made it to the final row of the pet department. Sergeant Darkow checked to the left and I covered his back by checking the long row to the right. As I quickly checked to the right I immediately heard Sergeant Darkow yell, "Drop the weapon!" As I turned towards the pet department I immediately saw a black male standing in the center of the aisle. He was holding a



rifle. I quickly identified that the male was holding a rifle and I could see the silhouette of the magazine seated in the weapon. Sergeant Darkow repeatedly yelled,"Drop the weapon!" The black male, who matched the description of the black male waving the rifle around (blue pants and blue shirt) did not drop the rifle. After repeated commands to drop the weapon the male turned towards us in an aggressive manner with the rifle in hand. At that time the black male was in a position where he could shoot me or Sergeant Darkow. I felt at that moment that my life was in immediate danger, that Sergeant Darkow's life was in immediate danger, and that the lives of all the families, children, and customers were in immediate danger. I then fired two rounds at the suspect. As I shot the suspect he began to move from my right to my left. Once I fired the shots he retreated backwards and dropped the rifle. He then fell backwards behind the end of the row and out of sight. At that time the rifle was in the open. I then quickly closed the distance between me and the suspect. As I neared the weapon, which was lying on the floor, I identified it again as being a black rifle with a seated magazine. As I neared the rifle the black male jumped from behind the aisle and charged towards the weapon. He began to reach for it as he neared it and I yelled for him to get on the ground. Just before reaching the rifle he collapsed to the floor. I then ordered him to roll over onto his stomach and put his hands behind his back. I then positioned myself behind the suspect and had to force his hands together. I then handcuffed him.

I then quickly checked the immediate area for any other threats. Once I determined the immediate area to be safe I directed my attention to the condition of the suspect. I could see that there were wounds to both of the suspect's arms. The wounds were near the elbows and were bleeding heavily. Due to the arm injuries and the heavy bleeding in those areas; I requested tourniquets be applied to the upper arms of the suspect. Officers Matt Stull, John Bondy, and Chris Williams were on scene at that time. They assisted in retrieving medical supplies and tourniquets. Officer Matt Stull then applied the tourniquets to the arms of the suspect. At that time medics were arriving on scene. I stayed with the suspect until the medics were there to treat him. The suspect was responsive during my time with him.

I was then directed by Sergeant Darkow to leave the store with him. We then left the store together and waited by his cruiser until additional units arrived on scene to assist. I was then transported to Soin Hospital.





I then heard dispatch say that the call was subject with a gun inside the store. They said it was a black male, said he was waiving the gun around, and he was loading it in the back of the



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store or in the store. They did mention he was in the pet area at one point.

MR. GRILLE: You said they did?


MR. WILLIAMS: Yeah.

MR. GRILLE: Okay.


MR. WILLIAMS: So I pulled to the front of the store, called on the scene, and deployed my rifle. When I got out of the car, I could hear sirens from other responding units. So at that point, my goal was just to wait for one other officer or whoever else showed up, and we were going to devise a quick plan as to what to do, and that was my goal at that point when I arrived on scene was to wait for the next officer.

As I was waiting for the second officer, I confirmed with dispatch because dispatch said at one point that he was pointing the gun at people. So I got on the radio just to confirm because Walmart does have guns and they sell guns. You know, could just be a person who bought a gun walking around the store. I confirmed with dispatch -- I asked them, I said -- I asked if the subject was pointing the gun at people, and they confirmed. They said yes.

So at that point, Sergeant Darkow was



1	next on scene. We were initially going to enter
2	through the garden center area, but they have, like,
3	a big barrier door, so we couldn't we didn't
4	think we could enter through there. So we entered
5	the furtherest door to the west with double doors
6	closest to the pharmacy. So


There were kids. There's just people all over the place, so we were just careful --

MR. GRILLE: Right.

MR. WILLIAMS: -- looking down each aisle. And as we got closer to the pet area, we kind of started to slow a little bit kind of looking down each aisle, and we still hadn't seen him. I think the description was a black male with -- with a gun.

So we got to the very end of the main hall, like to where the pet area was, the pets to one area, like the toys to the right, and we got to like the back wall to where we could, like, enter into the garden center.

So the last aisle to the pet area was to our left. So Darkow was starting to kind of scan to the left, cut the pie towards that final row, and because he was going to be open to the right, I told him I was going to cover his rear to the right as he went to the left. So he went to the left. I went to the right, did a quick check, saw no one down



that far direction to the right. As I did the check, I heard him say "drop the weapon." So I --

Q. Darkow said that?

MR. WILLIAMS: Yeah, Darkow said that. I don't know exact phrasing, "drop the weapon." So I immediately swung to his right, and he said "drop the weapon" again. And as he said that, I just panned down the aisle. I saw a black male, and I saw the rifle in grasp. The male would not drop the rifle. It looked like just your typical assault rifle in hand.

He -- like I say, he did not drop the rifle. Darkow said again to drop the rifle, and at that point, he made -- he was looking right at us. So he didn't drop the rifle after Darkow repeatedly told him to drop it. As I began to raise my left rifle already, I started to say drop the -- drop the weapon. This is as I begin to say it. He had the rifle within his body, and he made what I believe -- describe as, like, an aggressive stance with it as he was starting to make, like, a movement, like to the left, like he was going to do something with the rifle.


At that point, I felt that because he hadn't dropped the rifle, he was refusing our



commands, it was a crowded store full of kids and families, I felt at that point that my life was in danger, Sergeant Darkow's life was in danger, and all the families' and kids' lives in the store were in danger, and that if he got around us or escaped to the left to where he was headed, he's going to be an immediate threat to everyone inside the store.

So due to all those factors, I raised my sights up. He still had the rifle, and I fired two shots center mass at him. At that point, he dropped and kind of almost disappeared around the end. He dropped and dropped the rifle at the same time. And then as we started to walk towards him, he just appeared standing up and started to go towards the rifle.

And at that point, I couldn't -- sounded like he was saying something. I couldn't hear anything because I just fired the shots, kind of had like ringing. So he's about to go to the rifle -- he was going for the rifle again, so I raised -- I was about -- at that point, I felt like he was going to go for the rifle again. And just prior to him reaching that threshold where I was going to fire more rounds at him, he kind of hesitated or stopped, and that's when he went down again.




And then when he -- when he went down, I can see he was bleeding. I told him to put his hands behind his back, roll over, which he did. I then handcuffed him. And the rifle was away from him at that point, and I felt it was safe because it was away from him.

So then once he was cuffed, I could see he had no more weapons on him, then I turned to his -- his condition. He was bleeding profusely. I could see massive wounds to both arms near, like, the elbow/biceps area. So we did a quick scan of them, and I did not initially see any rounds to his body.

So at that moment, I believe Darkow called for a medic. So we called for a medic, called for additional units. We called shots had been fired, suspect was down. So once medics got rolling, we kind of secured the scene. Like I said, we got to his condition trying to see what was wrong with him.

So he was bleeding profusely from his arms. He was on his stomach so we could see he was bleeding, I just couldn't see exactly where. So because he had heavy wounds and bleeding from his arms, I got similar responding officers to bring



tourniquets, and we applied tourniquets to his upper arms to try and stop the bleeding.

Once we applied the tourniquets, he was -- he wasn't saying anything. He was just kind of moaning, the black male. He was kind of moaning, not saying anything. I told him to stay awake, that help's on the way. We're here to help you. Medics were going to get here soon. And after we applied the tourniquets, the medics -- someone called the medics were on scene. So before we did anything else, the medics were there and they were walking to him.

So at that point, that's pretty much my inter -- interaction. The medics took charge of the scene and of the subject and administered aid to him.

MR. GRILLE: Good. Then eventually your rifle ended up in the sergeant's car just through chain of custody?

MR. WILLIAMS: Yeah. What happened was once the scene was secure as far as the suspect was concerned, Darkow just said, hey, let me -- he handed me his rifle. Said, hey, let me get your rifle, so I handed him my rifle.

MR. GRILLE: All right.



1	MR. WILLIAMS: And then I eventually
2	handed his rifle to Matt Stahl who and that's the
3	last I saw of it. So, yeah, Sergeant Darkow took my

So Darkow is kind of scanning to the left and I'm kind of looking to the right. Then we reached the end and there was one more row left in the pet area.

He made a movement to what I interpreted as aggressive. He did -- he was moving with the rifle and was not dropping it, and I felt at that time he had a rifle in a position to where he could have raised it up or he could have shot either me or Sergeant Darkow. And I also felt that if he were to escape around the end and make a way to the rest of the store, that all the families and the kids were in the immediate risk as well.

So at that point when he didn't drop the weapon and he started making movements with it, I felt that my life was at risk, I felt that

Sergeant Darkow's life was at risk and I felt that all the families we passed walking into the store and the children, I thought they were all at risk.

Due to all the circumstances and with him failing to obey Sergeant Darkow's commands, I fired two shots at the subject. At that point he went down and dropped the rifle and kind of almost disappeared behind the end of the row. So we started making our way, and as we were making our way -- I could see the rifle, I could see the black male and as we were making our way to the rifle, I could see that it was a rifle.

AGENT HORNYAK: Uh-huh.

OFFICER WILLIAMS: And as we made our way to him, he like jumped back up and started running towards the rifle again. He was saying something but I couldn't hear. I couldn't hear anything at that point. My ears were ringing. So he was saying something. I was telling him to get down, get down, get down, because at that point he was already a threat to us and I was forced to engage him, and then he was about to come back for that weapon again.

AGENT HORNYAK: Uh-huh.

OFFICER WILLIAMS: So I felt just everything about him was aggressive. He came back at us after he had already been shot to what I considered to get the rifle again.

So he was about at the threshold to where I was considering shooting again when he collapsed. He came back towards us at the rifle and I'm telling him to get down, get down, get down, get down, get down on the round and he kind of reaches in the area of the rifle and kind of just collapses. So I kind of walked past the rifle and immediately scanned around to make sure there were no other threats and I tell him to roll over onto his belly and put his hands behind his back. He was kind of squirming and yelling and screaming stuff that I couldn't understand. He wasn't immediately cooperative, as far as putting his hands behind his back. I had to get on top of him and kind of pull his hands together to cuff him.

AGENT HORNYAK: Uh-huh.

OFFICER WILLIAMS: When I cuffed him, I could see that he had very serious injuries to one of his elbows and he had another wound to his other arm. I can't remember which arm was which that had the severe wound. So my immediate thought was, okay, he's down, he's injured, there is no immediate threat in the immediate area. Now, we have to treat him as a patient,

bleeding to the arms, and he was still making noises and moving as we stood over him. I just kept giving him words of encouragement. I told him to stay awake, stay awake. There were a couple of times where it seemed like he passed out or fell asleep and I was kind of tapping him on the side of the face, trying to get him to wake up, wake up, wake up, just trying to keep him awake and keep him alive.

The medics were there probably right when the tourniquets were applied and we, basically, just assessed his condition, kept him awake, tried to keep him conscious until the medics could get there who had better tools than we did at the time. So the medics got there and started treating him.

OFFICER WILLIAMS: At that point once they did their assessment, they loaded him up and took him away, and then after that I met with Darkow like kind of in the side hall and he took my rifle and gave me his rifle, and I knew it was probably just for evidence because they were going to have to take it eventually.
